<div>The casino of Kisangani was in 1970-72 at the hotel Zaire-Palace, former Congo-Palace. It was located below and behind the hotel Congo Palace next to the tennis courts of a club local and run by Greeks. It was a small local with a roulette (indicated on the satellite map with an red arrow). The information was obtained from former residents of Stanleyville, later Kisangani, Ms. Claire Dejaeger and Mr. Paul-René Hernard. <p>Costo, a relatively young man now making a name for himself in this extremely insecure part of eastern Zaïre, was born in what was Stanleyville during the city's heyday of Belgian prosperity. Although of diminutive stature and a light, almost fragile complexion, by virtue of a clear, authoritative voice and fluent command of Swahili he possessed the kind of commanding presence necessary in this now hostile place. He survived and actually prospered in the post-rebellion "Zairianization" of foreigner-owned properties that had pretty much wiped out Costo's father. And he freely admitted, not really knowing a home other than the Congo, that he was an unredeemable "Bwana," and simply could not live anywhere except in the Congo. As an enterprising man, and with some questionable sources of capital, he had established a <i>casino</i> in Kisangani. One was constantly surprised by the number of people—Zairian and foreign—who would show up at the <i>casino</i> with time on their hands and seemingly unlimited supplies of illegal hard currency. Costo knew what he was doing. <i>Kisangani</i>, so far off the beaten path, and beyond the reach of law as we knew it, was an ideal place for currency smugglers to operate; for ivory,</p>
